Hans Günter Brauch (Germany): Dr. phil. habil, since 1999 Privatdozent at the Free University of Berlin, Department of Political Science and Social Sciences, and since 1987 chairman of Peace Research and European Security Studies (AFES-PRESS). He was guest professor of international relations at the universities of Frankfurt on Main, Leipzig and Greifswald. From 1976 to 1989 he was research associate at Heidelberg and Stuttgart universities, a research fellow at Harvard and Stanford University and he was also teaching at the universities of Darmstadt, Tübingen, Stuttgart and Heidelberg.

Antonio Marquina (Spain): Ph.D., Chair for International Security and Cooperation and Professor of international relations at Complutense University in Madrid (CUM) since 1985, founder and director of the Research Unit on Security and Cooperation (UNISCI) at CUM. He has been the director of 14 research projects on European, Mediterranean, North African and Caucasus security and on Spanish foreign and security policy. Since 2002 he is a member of the French Conseil Economique de la Défense. From 1996 to 1997 he was the first president of STRADEMED, a network of research institutes working on security, defence and development issues in the Mediterranean. *Publications:* He is the author, editor and co-author of many books and reports in English and Spanish, among them several on CBMs in the Mediterranean. Paul F. Rogers (United Kingdom): Professor of Peace Studies, former head of the School for Peace Studies, Bradford University where he teaches courses on international security, arms control, and political violence. He was trained originally as a biologist and lectured at Imperial College, London as well as working as a Senior Scientific Officer on

a development programme in East Africa. He moved into peace and conflict research in the mid-1970's through an interest in conflict over resources. He focuses on the trends in international conflict, developing his analysis of the linkages between socio-economic divisions, environmental constraints and international insecurity. Much of his work concentrates on western military responses to regional conflicts and political violence, and he is also concerned with those trends in political violence likely to have the greatest impact on wealthy industrialised states. Paul Rogers lectures regularly at universities and defence colleges in several countries and is a frequent broadcaster on international security issues for the BBC World Service and other networks. His publications include 15 books and over 100 papers. His most recent book: *Losing Control - Global Security in the 21st Century*, was published in December 2000, a second edition, extending the analysis to the post 9/11 world, was published in June 2002. He has also written recently on the Provisional IRA's use of economic targeting in the 1990's. He has written articles for: *The World Today* and *New Political Economy* on the Kosovo War; with Oliver Ramsbotham, he wrote a review article: "Then and Now: Peace Research - Past and Future", for: *Political Studies*. He wrote articles on the Iraq crisis and on Britain's strategic defence review for *Disarmament Quarterly* and for *Contemporary Security Policy* on the Iraqi biological weapons programme. Working with Malcolm Dando and Simon Whitby, he has continued to work on aspects of biological warfare against crops, with publications including papers prepared for NATO Advanced Research Workshops in Prague and Bucharest. His articles are translated into French, German and Polish. He has written for: *The Sunday Times*, *The Observer* and *The Guardian*, and currently writes a weekly analysis of international security issues for
